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Introduction to the Area Plan

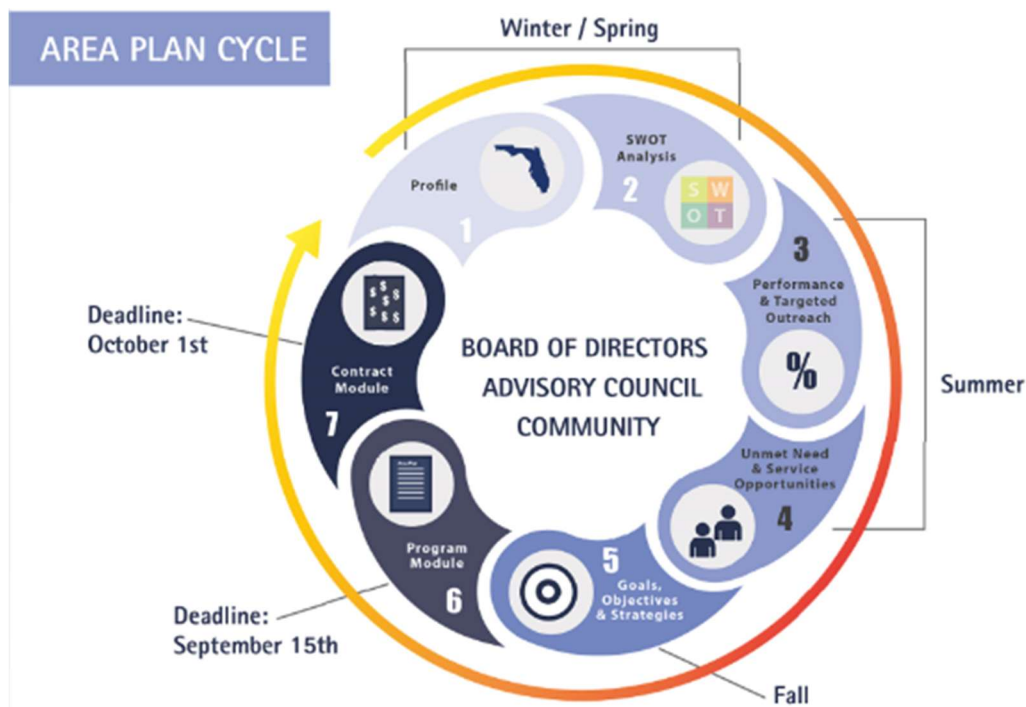
The Area Plan describes in detail the specific services to be provided to the population of older adults residing in each Planning and Service Area (PSA). The plan is developed from an assessment of the needs of the PSA as determined by public input that involves public hearings, the solicited participation of those affected and their caregivers, and service providers. The plan also states the goals and objectives that the Area Agency on Aging (AAA) and its staff and volunteers plan to accomplish during the planning period. This four-year cycle is for the period of January 1, 2024, through December 31, 2027.

The Area Plan is divided into two parts, the Program Module and the Contract Module.

The Program Module includes a profile of the PSA; a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis; an analysis of performance and unmet needs; the service plan including goals, objectives, and strategies; assurances; and other elements relating to the provision of services.

The Contract Module includes the elements of the plan relating to funding sources and allocations, as well as other administrative/contractual requirements, and otherwise substantiates the means through which planned activities will be accomplished.

In planning to produce the Area Plan, AAAs should consider the following Area Plan development cycle.



This recommended planning cycle features the development of the PSA Profile, followed by the completion of the comprehensive SWOT analysis during the winter and spring of the Area Plan submission year. The summer should feature the development of the Performance and Targeted Outreach and Unmet Need and Services opportunities components of the Area Plan. With the completion of these components, the AAA will be prepared to address the Goals, Objectives, and Strategies component of the Area Plan.

With the completion of each stage in development of the Area Plan, the AAA is required to submit the respective components to Department of Elder Affairs (DOEA) through their contract manager for review and feedback.

By the spring of each year, the Department of Elder Affairs will directly email Area Agencies on Aging executive directors. This email will include the Area Plan Program Module Template, Instructions, Area Plan Contract Module Template, and a table of due dates for submission of the Area Plan Cycle components.

AAA Board of Directors

The Agency is working collaboratively with the Department of Elder Affairs on a Governance Contract. Once the final contract is available and approved by the Board, the Agency intends to implement the provisions to maintain compliance under the Agreement. As a result, some information contained in this section will change during the first year of the Area Plan.

Membership Composition:

The Board of Directors consists of at least seven (7) members and not more than eleven (11) members. The goal is to have the board membership be representative of the age, gender, race, ethnicity and geography of the counties served in the PSA. The Agency endeavors to recruit members with diverse backgrounds in areas such as elder and general law, finance, insurance, public health, healthcare delivery, long term care, and government.

Frequency of Meetings:

Regular meetings of the board are held as necessary and generally occur monthly. In the event a quorum cannot be established or for an urgent matter a meeting may occur with the board Executive Committee which is comprised of six (6) members and includes the board officers.

A minimum of five (5) board meetings are held in a fiscal year. Board meetings are publicly noticed on the Agency website and the Florida Administrative Register.

Officer Selection Schedule:

Each year, the board votes on a slate of officers at their annual meeting and these officers comprise the board Executive Committee. The Executive Committee includes the Chair, Vice Chair, Secretary, Treasurer and 2 members at large.

AAA Advisory Council

Council Composition:

The Advisory Council shall consist of a membership of at least 15 members, but not to exceed 30 members.

Every county in PSA 9 shall be represented by a minimum of one Council member, except for Palm Beach County which shall have a minimum of seven members.

At least 50% of the Advisory Council shall consist of persons age 60 or older, including persons of diverse backgrounds, who are eligible to participate in Older American's Act services.

Membership shall, as nearly as possible, be representative of the demographics of PSA 9.

The Advisory Council shall be composed of residents from PSA 9, including one or more from each of the following categories:

- older individuals (including minority individuals and older individuals residing in rural areas) who are participants or who are eligible to participate in programs assisted under the Older American's Act of 1965, as amended in 2006;
- family caregivers of such individuals;
- representatives of older individuals;
- service providers;
- representatives of the business community;
- local elected officials;
- providers of veterans' health care;
- the general public;
- people with leadership expertise in areas appropriate for and in demand by the Agency;
- representation from the disability community

Frequency of Meetings:

General and Executive Committee meetings of the Advisory Council shall be held at least quarterly. Special meetings may be called by the Chair.

The Advisory Council will hold an Annual Meeting each year.

Member Selection Schedule:

Members shall be elected by a majority vote of those present at an appropriate Advisory Council meeting from a slate recommended by the Membership Committee which shall consider input from persons within PSA 9. This can occur at anytime during the year for general council members. Selection of mandated Council seats occur during the Annual Meeting in November of each year.

If a vacancy occurs in a mandated Council seat before November, the seat shall be filled for the remainder of the calendar year by an interim voting member by a vote at a regular meeting on the recommendation of the Membership Committee. The official term shall begin January of the following year.

Service Term(s):

New Members to the Advisory Council will be approved by the Advisory Council to a three year term. At the expiration of each term, Advisory Council members may recommit for an additional three year term to the Advisory Council. There is no limitation on the number of terms that Advisory Council members may serve as long as they are performing their role in an exemplary manner.

Executive Summary

The Area Agency on Aging of Palm Beach/Treasure Coast, Inc. is pleased to present this EXECUTIVE SUMMARY for the 2024-2027 Area Plan. Planning and Service Area 9 includes Palm Beach County, Indian River County, Martin County, Okeechobee County and St. Lucie County. In close partnership with the Department of Elder Affairs, the Area Agency on Aging of Palm Beach/Treasure Coast, Inc. administers Older Americans Act, General Revenue, and Statewide Managed Care funds as well as private grants and donations for service provision and access to information, resources and assistance. The service network includes more than 11 contracted providers.

The Area Agency on Aging of Palm Beach/Treasure Coast, Inc. (the Agency) is a private, non-profit organization that provides services to and advocacy for seniors, adults with disabilities and those who care for them. Established in 1988, the Area Agency on Aging was designated as an “Area Agency on Aging” (AAA) by the Florida Department of Elder Affairs in accordance with the Older Americans Act and as a fully implemented “Aging Resource Center” in 2008. In 2012 the Department of Elder Affairs expanded the designation of the Area Agency on Aging to an Aging & Disability Resource Center. This designation reflects the expansion of information and referral services to adults with disabilities.

Our focus for service delivery will continue to prioritize those in greatest economic or social need, with attention to low-income older individuals; including low-income minority older individuals, older individuals with limited English proficiency, and older individuals residing in rural areas. The role of the Agency has expanded to include person-centered access to information and resources to persons of all ages with respect to individual service needs and/or related caregiver concerns. Along these lines, the Agency recognizes the need for people of all ages to prepare for retirement and old age while helping them understand the service infrastructures that are available to support people as they age.

The four years that have passed since the completion of the last full cycle area plan have shown remarkable changes. Across the five (5) county service area, there are 703,349 individuals who are 60+ according to the 2022 DOEA County Profiles. The 60+ population in our Planning and Service Area has grown by nearly 8.6% from 2018 to 2022.

Organizational accomplishments since the previous plan are listed below.

- Completed a financial turnaround based on financial challenges that occurred in prior years. The Agency retired all debts and obligations restoring the financial health of the Agency.
- Implemented new financial policies including monthly reporting to governance to enhance transparency and controls.
- Segregated bank accounts for processing provider payments to enhance controls on restricted funds.
- Successfully completed the General Revenue competitive bid process to allocate nearly \$8.5 million of funding in our five-county service area with a service array of over 30 services.
- Successfully completed the Older Americans Act competitive bid process to allocate nearly \$6.5 million of funding in our five-county service area with a service array of over 30 services.
- Implemented \$ 18.9 million of new funding ensuring contract compliance with five new funding sources across contracted providers which resulted in more than 2.6 million meals for homebound seniors since the start of the pandemic as well as increased supportive services of counseling, telephone reassurance, expanding access to COVID-19 vaccines and energy assistance.
- Enhanced provider relations and support for PSA 9 Area Agency providers by working in a highly collaborative manner. This included increasing awareness of provider services among all Agency staff and Board Members.
- Supported providers with a high level of technical guidance to modify service delivery during COVID 19 emergency declarations.
- Secured donations from community partners including the Community Foundation for Palm Beach and Martin Counties, Florida Blue, Florida Power and Light, Palm Beach County, Palm Health Foundation, Quantum Foundation and United Way to expand technology and staffing to support the COVID-19 response.
- Secured donations from community partners including the Community Foundation for Palm Beach and Martin Counties, Quantum Foundation and United Way to expand access to nutrition services.
- Implemented remote working plans and policies to continue supporting Agency obligations by associates during the pandemic. Post pandemic, implemented hybrid work schedules to attract and retain associates.
- Implemented a telephone reassurance program providing information on topics such as fall prevention, managing chronic conditions, vaccine resources, preventing elder scams and obtaining food and housing resources.
- Partnered with the Memory Disorder Clinics to establish a Palm Beach County Dementia Care and Cure Task force representing the areas of transportation, direct services, communications, research, legal, first responders, departments of health, local funders, Alzheimer's Association, caregivers, adult protective services and veterans.

- eCIRTS Superuser led the implementation of the new DOEA client database across the Planning and Service area.
- Partnered with the local Health Care District to implement HRSA's program for the distribution of N95 masks and COVID Testing Kits to older adults and persons with a disability.
- Incorporated Healthy Aging Department and DOEA program participation strategies into the Community Health Improvement Plans for Martin, St. Lucie, Okeechobee and Palm Beach counties.
- Implemented the new service of Caregiver Follow-up to continue the support and socialization for caregivers who completed Powerful Tools for Caregivers.
- Implemented the Enhanced HCE program to assist seniors with home improvements.
- Expanded Healthy Aging evidence-based workshops to include both in-person and virtual workshops.
- Continued the Veterans Independence Program in collaboration with the West Palm Beach Veterans Administration Medical Center.
- Promoted the Hope Heroes volunteer opportunities with providers and the community at large.

Mission and Vision Statements

The Mission Statement defines the purpose and primary objectives of the AAA. The Vision Statement describes what the AAA intends to accomplish or achieve in the future.

Mission:

Our MISSION is to promote, support and advocate for the independence, dignity and wellbeing of seniors, adults with disabilities, and those who care for them in a manner that values diversity, reflects the communities we serve and embraces the collaboration of the aging network.

Vision:

The Area Agency on Aging of Palm Beach/Treasure Coast, Inc. is the recognized gateway to services for seniors, adults with disabilities and those who care for them.

Spotlight on Success Stories

Older Americans Act – Titles 3B and 3E

The mission of MorseLife Care Management & Counseling is to enhance the lives of seniors by providing the highest standard of care. Our dedicated staff fulfills this mission through extensive outreach, counseling, education, and support services for older adults and caregivers throughout Palm Beach County and the Treasure Coast. Team members actively represent the program at health fairs, educational forums, and community events across the service area.

Over the past 12 months, MorseLife counselors provided behavioral health counseling services to 165 individuals, addressing the emotional and mental health needs of older adults and caregivers in Palm Beach County Service Area A and the Treasure Coast communities in accordance with the Older Americans Act (OAA). Through OAA funding, additional seniors and caregivers experiencing emotional stressors and mental health concerns were able to access vital in-person counseling services that they may not otherwise have received.

Older Americans Act – Title 3E

Senior Resource Association (SRA) provides services to support and advocate for the independence and dignity of seniors in Indian River County. As we age, it becomes more

and more challenging to stay active and manage daily tasks. SRA helps seniors remain healthier, more secure, and socially connected.

A client in her eighties was widowed and living with her caregiver. She had been suffering from depression. She began attending SRA's DayAway Adult Day Care regularly. Attending DayAway would always boost her mood and make her happy. Her caregiver was very appreciative of the services and would not have been able to keep the client in the home as long as she did without the assistance from SRA and the OAA Title III-E funding.

Older Americans Act – Title 3C1

An older adult with limited ability to leave home regularly faced challenges accessing nutritious meals on a daily basis. Reliable access to food became increasingly important as transportation and mobility barriers made frequent trips outside the home difficult. Through The Volen Center, a nonprofit organization that supports older adults and caregivers in South Palm Beach County, the client received weekly grab-and-go meals through the Older Americans Act Congregate Meal Program. The program provides nutritious meals that participants can take home, helping older adults maintain access to healthy food while supporting their independence.

The meals supplied the client with a dependable source of nutrition throughout the week and reduced concerns about obtaining food on a regular basis. According to the client, the meals have become an important part of his weekly food supply and have made a meaningful difference in daily life.

By providing convenient access to nutritious meals, the grab-and-go meal program helps older adults maintain their health, reduce food insecurity, and continue living independently within their communities.

Older Americans Act – Title 3C2

The Mission of Okeechobee Senior Services (OSS) is “To provide residents of Okeechobee County age 60 and above access to resources, activities and assistance to promote mental and physical well-being, preserve independence and to improve their quality of life through Case Management, in-home supportive services, home-delivered meals and the Young at Heart Center of Okeechobee, thereby enabling them to remain in their homes and avoid institutionalization for as long as it is safely possible.” OSS' Home-Delivered Meals program is a cornerstone of their services for Okeechobee seniors. By providing nutritious meals, OSS addresses a fundamental need and enhances seniors' overall well-being. Over the past several years and to further support their most vulnerable food insecure clients, OSS partners with a local group of women to offer weekend food packages. The number of weekend food packages has grown this year to twenty-six individuals facing severe food insecurity.

In response to OSS' annual satisfaction survey, a client noted that she is very satisfied with the program and how it meets her nutritional needs, noting satisfaction with the quality, choices, and delivery of her meals. During a semi-annual visit with a 75-year-old male client, he stated due to his failing health he is unable to fix a meal some days, but he can depend on his driver to deliver his lunch. The driver is aware of his health and

ensures that she takes a minute to visit each day to verify that he is doing well or if he needs assistance.

These experiences are a wonderful testament to the dedication of the OSS team and the difference the Home-Delivered Meal program makes in the lives of Okeechobee seniors.

Older Americans Act – Title 3D

An older gentleman joined the Area Agency on Aging of Palm Beach/Treasure Coast's Matter of Balance workshop at the urging of his daughter after he had a fall which it took him months of physical therapy to recover from. He was skeptical about the education portion of the workshop but really started to participate after the exercise portion started. He has continued his wellness journey by attending Diabetes Self Management and Tai Ji Quan evidence-based workshops.

He has shared the following, "I can't thank you enough, these classes have become an important part of my health, stability and overall well-being. As someone living with diabetes, I have found Tai Chi to be far more than a recreational activity. It has helped me improve my balance, coordination, flexibility, circulation and general sense of physical confidence. Just as importantly, it has helped me feel steadier on my feet and more mindful of my movements-both of which are essential in preventing falls. I understand firsthand that a single fall can lead to serious injury and loss of independence. These programs have provided me with practical, affordable and preventive ways to help me remain active, safer and more independent. These classes are not just wellness programs; they are valuable public health services. For me these classes offer encouragement, community, and a positive reason to stay engaged. It's not just exercise. It's connection and continuity. Thank you for all you do."

Alzheimer's Disease Initiative (ADI)

The Council on Aging of St. Lucie (COASL) seeks to develop, coordinate and administer home and community-based programs and services for senior persons of St. Lucie County and adjoining areas.

One of COASL's clients is a divorced male in his sixties who lives with his primary caregiver, his sister. He previously suffered from a series of strokes and has since been diagnosed with dementia and additional health-related issues. He could no longer live on his own, so he came to live with his sister/caregiver who is also in poor health and has difficulties meeting his care needs. The client began attending the COASL Adult Day Care for in-facility respite and also started receiving in-home respite to help meet his needs. He enjoys interacting with his peers and staff, is very talkative and loves playing games. Prior to attending the Center, he was very withdrawn, depressed, and was very agitated and argumentative with his sister. His attendance at the Center has helped to improve his overall state of mind; he is much happier now and has an outlet for socialization, where he did not before. He has several friends at the Center and very much enjoys attending. He gets up excited every morning and is ready to

attend and be with his friends. The service has helped to prevent institutional placement, as the caregiver could not have continued to meet his care needs alone.

Home Care for the Elderly (HCE)

For seniors, their families, and caregivers, the Council on Aging Martin County (COAMC) is their trusted and comprehensive hub for senior resources. They work with the community to reduce anxiety, depression, loneliness, and hunger. They help seniors live a safer, healthier, and happier life. An HCE client in her mid-sixties lives with her husband. The husband is the primary caregiver. The client is bedbound and paralyzed from the chest down. She has chronic pain and must have her husband do everything for her. The husband did not have any support before COAMC enrolled him in HCE-funded services. COAMC staff was able to provide a basic subsidy check of \$160.00 per month through HCE funding. This helped to pay for groceries, medication costs, and utility bills. HCE funding was able to provide home-delivered meals for the client. These meals helped to provide respite for the husband, nutrition for the client, as well as cut down on food costs for the household. HCE funding was able to provide incontinence supplies for the client as well as in-home health through a home health agency. These services help keep the client safe and cared for as bathing, meal prep, and companionship are provided. These services provide much needed and appreciated respite for the client's husband.

Community Care for the Elderly (CCE)

Another client of COAMC's world had gradually narrowed. He was in his mid-eighties and physical decline had taken his mobility, relegating him to a wheelchair and a strict routine of transfers from bed to chair, to recliner. Watching this shift was his devoted wife, who poured her remaining energy into his daily care, bravely fighting through her own physical limitations and failing health. The love was endless, but the resources were running dry.

The turning point came during an annual assessment, standing as a testament to the profound power of public support. When the case manager noticed a heavy, dilapidated transport chair held together by duct tape, a specialized financial lifeline was put into motion: the CCE program. CCE is not just a line item on a budget; it is a mechanism designed precisely to preserve human dignity when families hit their absolute limit. Through the targeted deployment of CCE funds, the crumbling, heavy chair was replaced with a state-of-the-art, lightweight transport model. Instantly, the grueling physical toll on the client's wife vanished. No longer forced to lift an agonizingly heavy frame despite her own physical issues, she found immediate relief. The funding did not stop there. It stepped into the home to provide a consistent, professionally trained caregiver to manage personal care and housekeeping, restoring a sense of order and peace to their daily lives.

To secure their safety around the clock, CCE funding also provided the client with an emergency alert button. This small device bridged the gap between vulnerability and total security. The story of this family is a beautiful example of how structured,

compassionate community funding acts as a quiet guardian, stepping in to carry the weight when elderly citizens and their caregivers can no longer carry it alone.

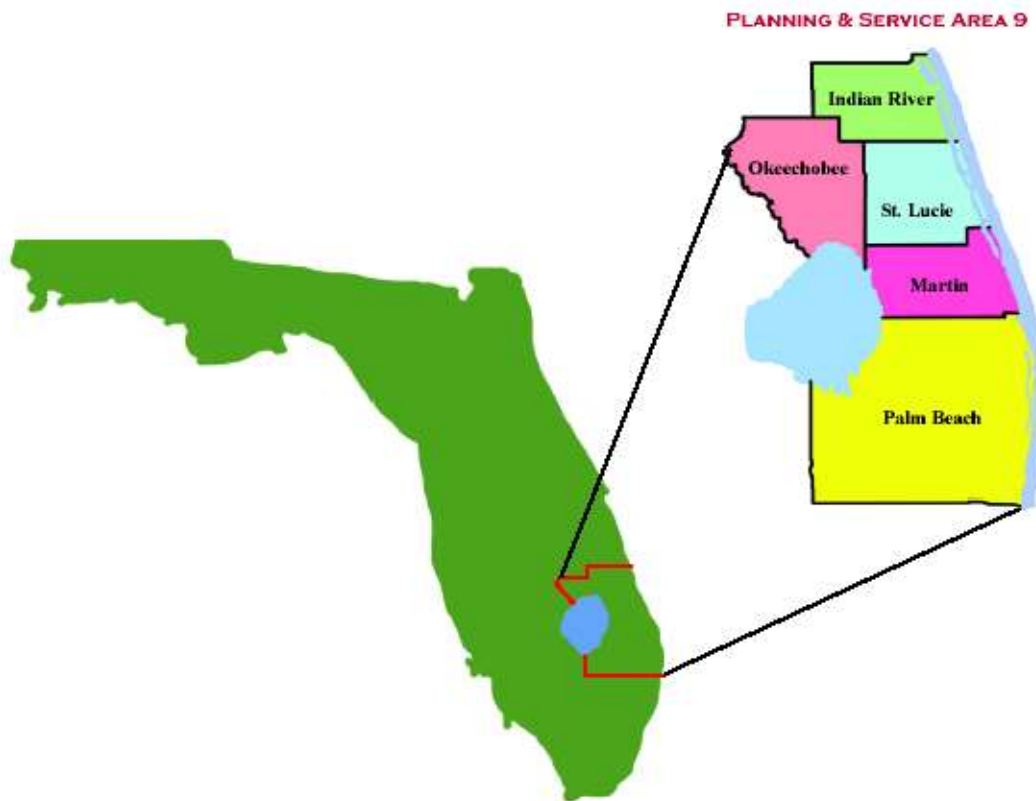
Profile

This section provides an overview of the social, economic, and demographic characteristics of the PSA. The focus of this overview includes consideration of those geographic areas and population groups within the PSA of older individuals with greatest economic need, greatest social need, or disabilities, with particular attention to low-income minority older individuals, older individuals with limited English proficiency, and older individuals residing in rural areas.

Identification of Counties:

PSA 9 encompasses five counties of Palm Beach County, Okeechobee County and the Treasure Coast Counties of Indian River, Martin, and St. Lucie. A map depicting both the counties within PSA 9 and the relation of PSA 9 to the state of Florida is pictured below. Four of the five counties (Palm Beach, Martin, St. Lucie, and Indian River) are bordered on their East coast by the Atlantic Ocean. Okeechobee County is located on the banks of Lake Okeechobee, the second largest body of freshwater in the United States.

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY

Indian River County is bordered on the north by Brevard County, on the west by Okeechobee and Osceola Counties, on the south by St. Lucie County, and on the east by the Atlantic Ocean. It is the northernmost county in PSA 9 and is approximately 503 square miles in geographic size.

MARTIN COUNTY

Martin County is 100 miles north of Miami and 250 miles south of Jacksonville. It is bordered to the north by St. Lucie County, the west by Glades County, the south by Palm Beach County, and the east by the Atlantic Ocean. It is approximately 556 square miles in size geographically.

OKEECHOBEE COUNTY

Okeechobee County is located on the northern banks of Lake Okeechobee, 70 miles northwest of West Palm Beach and 110 miles south of Orlando. Okeechobee is bordered to the north by Indian River and Osceola Counties, the west by Highlands and Glades Counties, the south by Palm Beach County and the east by St. Lucie and Martin Counties. It is approximately 774 square miles in size geographically. Okeechobee County is the smallest county in the PSA in terms of population.

PALM BEACH COUNTY

Palm Beach County is bordered on the north by Martin County, on the west by Hendry County and Lake Okeechobee, on the south by Broward County, and on the east by the Atlantic Ocean. It is the most southern county in Planning and Service Area 9. At 2,023 square miles, Palm Beach County is the largest county geographically in the State of Florida and is approximately the same size as the entire state of Rhode Island. Its sheer size presents unique challenges to service delivery.

ST. LUCIE COUNTY

St. Lucie County is bordered on the north by Indian River County, on the west by Okeechobee County, on the south by Martin County, and on the east by the Atlantic Ocean. It is approximately 572 square miles in size geographically. Incorporated in 1905, St. Lucie County is included in the Port St. Lucie, FL Metropolitan Statistical Area, which is also included in the Miami-Fort Lauderdale-Port St. Lucie, FL Combined Statistical Area. It is comprised of the City of Fort Pierce (county seat), City of Port St. Lucie and St. Lucie Village.

Identification of Major Communities:

INDIAN RIVER COUNTY COMMUNITIES

Indian River County is made up of five districts and is governed by a five-member commission elected county-wide. Within the county are five incorporated municipalities. Following is a brief summary of the major communities in Indian River County.

Vero Beach

The City of Vero Beach is the county seat and the largest incorporated municipality with an estimated population of more than 15,220. Greenery, open space, unspoiled

beaches, and ocean vistas characterize this community which is the commercial and cultural center of the county. Originally a stop on the Florida East Coast Railroad, Vero Beach was incorporated in 1910. The city is under a council-manager form of government.

Sebastian

At the northern end of the county, Sebastian is a community of an estimated 22,000 people. It grew up around the fishing industry and today is enjoyed by residents as well as visitors for surfing, fishing, swimming, boating and other water-oriented activities. An incorporated city, Sebastian has the friendliness of a small town. It has a council-manager form of government.

Fellsmere

A rural town of an estimated 3,813 residents in northwestern Indian River County, Fellsmere was once a center for growing sugar cane and pineapple. Today, the community's economy is based on citrus crops and cattle. It is incorporated and has a council-mayor form of government.

Indian River Shores

Between ocean and river north of Vero Beach, Indian River Shores is an exclusive residential community with an estimated population of more than 3,901, many of whom are retired corporate executives. It is incorporated and has a council-manager form of government.

Orchid

Orchid, with its population of about 140, is a new, luxury, barrier island community. It is incorporated and has a council-manager form of government.

MARTIN COUNTY COMMUNITIES

Most of Martin County is unincorporated with Stuart being the largest municipality and the small communities of Ocean Breeze Park, Sewall's Point, and Jupiter Island being the only other incorporated municipalities.

Martin County is significantly rural, although significant growth in terms of housing starts has taken place in the central sector of the county, particularly in Palm City and Hobe Sound. The three primary population centers of Stuart, Sewall's Point and Jupiter Island are along the eastern coastal corridor. Indiantown is the only community in the western part of the county and its population is small, largely migrant, and low-income. Martin County is known for its policies of controlled development – there is little urban or suburban sprawl and the result is limited overall population growth from year to year.

OKEECHOBEE COUNTY COMMUNITIES

The City of Okeechobee is the major population center in Okeechobee County with Fort Drum to the northwest being the only other small outlying town. This is a highly rural county.

PALM BEACH COUNTY COMMUNITIES

The largest city both in area and population in Palm Beach County is West Palm Beach, which covers 52 square miles and has an incorporated population of 101,668. Boca Raton is second with 85,413 residents, followed by Boynton Beach, 68,741, Delray Beach, 61,495, and Wellington, 57,514. The county's smallest town in population is Cloud Lake with 133 residents. The smallest municipalities in land area are Briny Breezes and Cloud Lake, both at .06 of a square mile.

ST. LUCIE COUNTY COMMUNITIES

The two largest cities in St. Lucie County are Fort Pierce and Port St. Lucie. Fort Pierce and St. Lucie County continue to lead the State of Florida in grapefruit production. Several large juice companies are based in St. Lucie, including Tropicana.

Economic and Social Resources:

In addition to DOE A programs, the Agency and its contracted providers manage other grant funds that provide economic and social resources for seniors and caregivers. The Veterans' Independence Program supports Veterans with in-home supports. The Benefits Enrollment Center assists seniors to apply for subsidies, food stamps, and energy assistance. The Agency partners with the Florida Atlantic University Memory Disorder Clinic and Palm Beach Neuroscience to implement the Dementia Care and Cure Initiative in Palm Beach County. Florida Atlantic University also operates the Lewis and Ann Green Memory and Wellness Center. In Martin County, Martin County HUGS is a collaborative effort between Alzheimer's Community Care and the Council on Aging of Martin County at the Kane Center to make Martin County a Dementia Friendly Community.

Both Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County and Senior Resource Association provide public guardianship programs. Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County also has a Fair Housing Project. They offer the program “Wills on Wheels.”

Many of our contracted providers operate senior centers that include opportunities for socialization, education, and economic assistance. In Martin County, The Joseph C. and Ann S. Day Medical Center is located at the Kane Center. The Kane Center operates an Integrated Memory Enhancement Program. Senior Resource Association’s DayAway centers are the only centers in Indian River County licensed by the Agency for Health Care Administration.

In Palm Beach County, The Volen Center provides a variety of educational and enriching opportunities and stimulating discussion. These include lecture series, philosophical and current event discussions, and computer classes. Palm Beach County Division of Senior and Veteran Services activities/programs include: book discussion groups, arts and crafts, creative writing and language classes, drawing, china and one-stroke painting, ceramics, wood carving, quilting, crochet, knitting, mahjong, bridge, cards, billiards and bingo. In conjunction with AARP, Palm Beach County Division of Senior and Veteran Services provide free income tax completion & filing for seniors. Ruth and Norman Rales Jewish Family Services provides emergency funds for basic necessities and other urgent needs. Their food pantry delivers bi-monthly food packages to qualified seniors, individuals and families providing much needed sustenance to those in need.

The Council on Aging of St. Lucie Senior Center has Line Dancing, Bingo and Movie Days. Okeechobee Senior Services has redesigned the Young at Heart Center to accommodate clients and expanded programming to include yoga classes and senior swim. Lola and Saul Kramer Services Agency operates MorseLife Care Management and Counseling Services which provides Care Management services to caregivers. Their PACE program operates in Palm Beach County.

Alzheimer’s Community Care operates a 24-hour crisis hotline. They offer Family Nurse Navigator services at no cost to families or to health insurance. They also provide ID Locator service.

Description of Service System:

There are six lead agencies in PSA 9 – one each in Indian River, St. Lucie, Okeechobee, and Martin counties. These are Senior Resource Association, Council on Aging of St. Lucie, Okeechobee Senior Services and Council on Aging of Martin County, respectively. In Palm Beach County, the Palm Beach County Division of Senior and Veteran Services serves the Northern part of the County. Mae Volen Senior Center serves the Southern part of the County. As Lead Agencies, these organizations manage the Community Care for the Elderly, Home Care for the Elderly, Alzheimer's Disease Initiative and Emergency Home Energy Assistance for the Elderly programs. These same agencies serve as the OAA Nutrition Providers.

Additional OAA services are provided through the Lead Agencies mentioned above as well as Alzheimer's Community Care, MorseLife Care Management and Counseling Services, and Ruth and Norman Rales Jewish Family Services. Legal Aid Society of Palm

Beach County manages all OAA legal services throughout the PSA. Ruth and Norman Rales also serves Holocaust Survivors through LSP funding. The Council on Aging of Martin County has LSP funding to serve seniors in the Village of Indiantown. Alzheimer's Community Care provides services under the Alzheimer's Disease Initiative.

Title IIID services are provided directly by the Area Agency on Aging of Palm Beach/Treasure Coast, Inc. as are the Title IIIE services Powerful Tools for Caregivers, Caregiver Follow-up, and Caring for You, Caring for Me. The Helpline provides Information and Referral and Screening and Assessment services throughout the PSA. SHINE and BEC programs are also managed directly by the Agency as are the Elder Rights and Veteran's Independence programs.

Role in Interagency Collaborative Efforts:

The Area Agency on Aging of Palm Beach/Treasure Coast, Inc. participates in a multitude of collaborative efforts across the PSA. These include initiatives directed toward transportation, healthy living, elder rights, wellness and more. The chart below reflects these collaborations and identifies the focus areas.

Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats (SWOT) Analysis

SWOT Development Process Description:

The development of the SWOT analysis started through meetings with Senior Management. Senior Management included the Chief Executive Officer, Chief Financial Officer, Director Consumer Care and Planning, Compliance Officer, Helpline Director and Director of Communications/Foster Grandparents. The Director, Consumer Care and Planning served as the scribe and captured the elements of the analysis.

The draft SWOT was presented to the Advisory Council for additional input and feedback prior to advancing the document to the board. The board reviewed the SWOT at the February 28, 2023 meeting.

Strengths:

- The Agency has positive relationships in the community.
- The transparency and way the Agency acknowledged its financial challenges in 2019 and completed the financial recovery enhanced credibility with providers and community agencies.
- Revised financial policies including monthly reporting to governance (Finance Committee and Board) have enhanced transparency and controls.
- The Agency has secured special funding during the pandemic that has enabled a heightened level of service be delivered through 2024.
- The Agency has retired debt and obligations and has established a positive undesignated reserve.
- The collaborative nature that the Agency works with Aging Network providers has created a healthy environment and dedication to the delivery of services.
- Aging Network providers continued to perform at a high level during the pandemic.
- The Agency has a dedicated, diverse staff, many of whom have strong institutional knowledge of Agency operations.
- Associates have a commitment to the organization's mission and to serving all diverse needs regardless of financial situation or cultural barriers.
- The Agency has an Advisory Council and Board of Directors which are dedicated to ensuring the Agency fulfills its mission and delivers high quality services in the community.
- The Agency continues to receive support from the Department of Elder Affairs and maintains a positive relationship at all levels of the organization.

- During the pandemic, staff has learned how to continue productive operations outside the traditional office setting which will make us stronger during disasters or other emergency events.
- Staff is measured by outcomes, individual productivity, and accountability.

Weaknesses:

- The Agency lacks sufficient funds to meet the needs of all clients and follows a process of prioritizing services.
- The services delivered by the Agency and its aging network providers are not widely recognized by the community.
- The Agency is limited in the level of compensation for the knowledge level required in most positions.
- Recruitment is a challenge with several positions remaining vacant for months.
- Low unemployment rates/high inflation has resulted in excessive turnover and significant challenges in recruitment.
- The requirements under public meeting laws require an in-person quorum which at times is a governance challenge.
- The ADRC has limited hours (8:00 AM – 5:00 PM Monday through Friday) and after hour calls are managed on a call back basis.
- The transition to eCIRTS has impacted the productivity for Agency staff and providers.
- Outreach in the community can better reflect the scope of all programs and services offered by the Agency.

Opportunities:

- Management of surplus/deficit across all program funding and providers will be important to ensure the proper utilization of financial resources.
- Continue to build upon trusted relationships with providers by providing enhanced support and collaboration.
- Increase the public awareness of information, referral services available by the Agency.
- Continue to embrace local foundation support to meet matching requirements under various grants and programs.
- Improve Board development and recruitment to achieve continuity of institutional knowledge, diversity, and geographical representation.
- Enhance information and resources available through the website.
- Continue to build upon the long-standing relationship with community partners.

- Increase recruitment of volunteers particularly in the SHINE program.
- Develop programs that may assist caregivers fulfill their role more effectively and reduce fatigue.
- Enhance the reporting and visibility of the waitlist pre-enrollment list to demonstrate additional needs/ funding to support these older adults and their caregivers.
- Work collaboratively with the Department of Elder Affairs to refine eCIRTS and integrate the existing Refer data and functionality.
- Work closely with the West Palm Beach Veteran Affairs Medical Center to expand the Veterans Independence Program by providing services to those veterans located in non-rural areas
- Expand the awareness of all of the caregiver support services that are available through the aging network.

Threats:

- The Agency is subject to public health emergencies such as a pandemic and natural disasters such as hurricanes, floods, etc. and needs to continue to operate to serve seniors in need.
- While the Agency has enhanced funding through the American Rescue Act through 2024, there is not adequate funding to sustain the enhanced level of service.
- Legislative changes may modify or mandate the scope or operation of the Agency.
- There are key staff member dependencies and succession planning is challenging as a small non-profit organization.
- There are growing shortages of CNAs, HHAs, and other social and healthcare support staff to adequately staff home and community-based services.
- The resources needed to support eCIRTS at the Agency and provider level continue to put challenges on limited time and financial resources.
- eCIRTS interfaces and accurate reporting provide challenges for data integrity, outcome measurements, and contract compliance across the aging network.

The 2022 Targeting Report previously stated that the Agency is not meeting the rural indicator for St. Lucie and Martin counties. The 2023 Targeting Report also indicated that the Agency is not meeting the rural indicator in St. Lucie, Martin, Okeechobee, and Palm Beach counties. The 2024 Targeting Report indicates that the Agency is not meeting the rural indicator in Martin and Okeechobee counties and in PSA 9. The Targeting Report indicates that 100% of the population for indicator in Okeechobee County is considered rural, yet the 381 served and screened clients in Okeechobee are not considered rural in this Targeting Report. In prior years, the Okeechobee rural indicator was met with 100% performance so a change to 0% is one that we are still seeking a resolution for. In the past, when investigating areas in Martin and St. Lucie counties where the rural target was not met, the GIS maps shows that the areas with unmet needs included ranches, airports, parks, and fishing and camping resorts. These would typically not be opportunities for outreach to rural, low income, older adults, and their caregivers.

Plans to address all targeting categories over the next year for both our staff and providers are outlined below. This section also includes details of how previously employed outreach methods have proven to be successful.

PSA 9
1. Describe strategies to address the unique and particular needs at the county and community levels (e.g., transportation for individuals in rural and/or isolated areas, and access to SNAP and other food assistance for low-income individuals). Response: The Area Agency on Aging (AAA) and its contracted providers employ a comprehensive, coordinated approach to address the diverse and evolving needs of older adults across the Planning and Service Area (PSA), with particular attention to rural, isolated, low-income, and minority populations. Strategies focus on improving access to transportation, nutrition services, benefits such as SNAP, housing resources, healthcare, and social supports. Healthy Aging has implemented a lending library of tablets to distribute to seniors so they can have access to evidence-based workshops that address health. These programs can engage seniors from 6 – 14 weeks in programs as well as keeping them connected to others to help prevent social isolation. Healthy Aging utilizes 12 tablets in the lending library program. Healthy Aging has been able to keep seniors engaged on an average of 2 consecutive workshops of different topics. There is a need for additional education to prevent Elder Abuse and Exploitation (Both abuse related and criminal related). The Elder Rights Department partners with agencies, organizations or venues to provide community outreach presentations. The Elder Rights Department met with AARP's Associate State Director of Advocacy, AARP FL regarding their virtual Florida Fraud Resource Center and how AARP can be of assistance to our Agency. AARP is looking to create additional outreach materials and trainings to assist with the education and prevention of Elder Abuse and Exploitation. The greatest needs at this time are for housing and food. The Helpline Director serves on United Way of Palm Beach County's Board of the Emergency Food and Shelter Program and the Homeless Prevention Workgroup. The Helpline will address the needs for food and housing in all areas of our PSA by retaining the most up-to-date resources to offer assistance to low-income individuals with increased housing needs such as rent and utility assistance, as well as those in need of food resources such as SNAP, HDM, farmer's markets, and food pantries. The Helpline plans to assist those in rural areas who face not having nearby access to purchase healthy food options with presenting Agency stats to the Inter-Agency meetings, identifying areas of need based on the calls received. The Helpline will collaborate with other community partners to share resources and obtain referrals. Senior Resource Association (SRA) actively participates in the Senior Collaborative of Indian River County, Livable Indian River, and other action-oriented initiatives that address issues facing seniors and other residents, such as affordable housing. During 2026, SHINE has formalized 34 community partnerships documented through MOUs or Partnership Forms. These relationships will afford an opportunity to promote all Agency programs in the future. With the ability to deliver in-home counseling services, with no charge or insurance claim, the MorseLife Care Management and Counseling (MorseLife) staff eliminate both physical and financial boundaries for older adults seeking caregiver or mental health counseling. Caregivers do not have to secure respite for their loved ones and no transportation is required. Clients also appreciate not having to request a referral through their doctor or insurance. In addition, the privacy, intimacy and confidentiality that can be assured within one's home, tends to give clients a peace of mind which makes therapy more effective. Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County (LAS) Elder Law Project (ELP) engages in outreach activities to the elder population of Palm Beach County with an emphasis on ensuring outreach to minority, rural,

and/or low-income senior populations. LAS's outreach efforts include, at a minimum, yearly seminars and intake at senior centers across Palm Beach County. Seminars and intake will occur upon request at the various public and private residential senior communities in Palm Beach County. ELP staff participate in Fearless Caregiver Conferences. There is a monthly legal clinic at the Veterans Administration Medical Center in West Palm Beach as well as a Veterans' Legal Services Clinic at Indian River State College in Port St. Lucie. The minority and/or low-income elder populations that Legal Aid will target in its outreach endeavors include the African-American communities in West Palm Beach, Pleasant City/Mangonia Park, Riviera Beach, Lake Park, Delray Beach, Boynton Beach, Belle Glade, Pahokee and South Bay; the Hispanic communities in Lake Worth, Boynton Beach, Delray Beach, Belle Glade, Pahokee and West Jupiter and the Haitian communities in Boynton Beach, Delray Beach East and the Western communities. These populations have been targeted due to their lack of knowledge of the complexity of the legal system and/or their limited English-speaking ability, they are easy prey for unethical business persons, caretakers and relatives, and there is a high rate of elder exploitation and consumer scams. LAS's ELP outreach efforts to the above minority and low-income communities will consist of contacting the human services organizations that serve these populations.

Okeechobee Senior Services (OSS) provides information for MTM transportation when inquiries are made. Case Managers assist with the necessary application, if needed. Information is provided to seniors seeking to apply for or renew SNAP benefits. **An up-to-date Resource Guide is provided to clients, those inquiring about services, and seniors visiting the Center.** An up-to-date list of local food pantries is available upon request and information about Treasure Coast Food Drives is distributed. A local group of volunteers provide weekend/holiday food bags for Home Delivered Meals clients dealing with food insecurities. All items in the food bags are purchased items that are factory sealed. The provider aims to obtain emergency shelf stable food boxes to assist clients in the event of an emergency. A small food cabinet has been established for congregate meals clients to utilize as needed. Shelf stable food items and personal care items are provided by donations.

Alzheimer's Community Care (ACC) operates 11 Specialized Alzheimer's Care and Service Centers with locations throughout Palm Beach, Martin, and St. Lucie Counties.

The Specialized Adult Day Care service provided therapeutic activities, meals, and health monitoring for 334 unduplicated patients in our day centers with 334 caregivers receiving respite.

The Family Navigator serves as a lifeline for families in Palm Beach, Martin and St. Lucie counties who are living with Alzheimer's disease and related neurocognitive disorders. The FN's provide caregivers with the support, tools and resources needed to continue providing home-based care for their loved ones.

The ACC ID Locator Service provides an additional safety net tool for patients with Alzheimer's disease and related neurocognitive disorders who may wander away from a safe and supervised setting.

ACC led a contingency of 13 volunteers in February of 2025 (mostly caregivers from the three counties) and 9 staff/board members to Tallahassee to educate legislators and staff on the needs of Florida's families impacted by Alzheimer's disease.

Council on Aging of St. Lucie's (COASL) 2025 Partnership with SHINE of Area Agency on Aging for the provision of several workshops throughout the year for Medicare Overview, Insurance Counseling, Long Term Care Choices, Preventative Services, etc., at both Port St. Lucie and Fort Pierce Senior Centers

COASL's 2025 Partnership with Treasure Coast Food Bank for the provision of SNAP-ED Nutrition Classes provided several times through the year at both Port St. Lucie and Fort Pierce Senior Centers

In 2025 COASL participated in the grand opening celebration of the Florida Community Health Center's opening of their Adult & Senior Health Center in support and advocacy for our senior community

COASL partners with SHINE of Area Agency on Aging for the provision of several workshops throughout the year for Medicare Overview, Insurance Counseling, Long Term Care Choices, Preventative Services, etc., at both Port St. Lucie and Fort Pierce Senior Centers.

COASL partners with Treasure Coast Food Bank for the provision of SNAP-ED and Nutrition Classes provided several times throughout the year at both Port St. Lucie and Fort Pierce Senior Centers.

COASL partners with Cleveland Clinic for the provision of funds towards nutrition programs to address food insecurity and reduce the number of individuals on the Home Delivered Meal waitlist.

COASL Case Managers and Nutrition Manager provide SNAP-ED and assist with applying/renewing SNAP benefits for clients.

COASL partners with Agents That Service America Health for the provision of Fresh Markets in Fort Pierce high need areas several times a year– seniors will be provided with boxes of fresh produce.

COASL has annually applied for and been awarded with various grants to address food insecurity for the provision of home delivered meals and nutrition education.

COASL partners with the City of Port St. Lucie Neighborhood Services Department to facilitate outreach and educational events to high need areas.

In 2026 AAA/SHINE signed an MOU with COASL/Fort Pierce to refer individuals to SHINE for counseling. Planned outreach for 2027.

Ruth Rales 2025 \$11,250,000 provided in Holocaust Survivor Assistance provided for services to 390 survivors.

The Volen Center (TVC) addresses the unique needs of older adults and caregivers in South Palm Beach County through transportation, congregate nutrition, adult day care, and counseling services that support independence and reduce isolation.

TVC offers congregate dining sites in low-income zip codes. Low-income areas where congregate sites are not available, pop-up grab and go sites are offered.

Adult Day Care services are offered at two locations operated by TVC, providing supervised care, therapeutic activities, meals, and respite for family caregivers, helping participants remain safely in the community.

TVC also provides counseling services to address grief, caregiver stress, life transitions, and social isolation.

Transportation through TVC is available to seniors to connect older adults to nutrition programs, adult day care, medical appointments, and other essential community resources.

Palm Beach County Division of Senior and Veteran Services (DSVS) partners with the Palm Beach County Food Bank to provide educational cooking demonstrations as well as fresh produce boxes once a month. The Food Bank also helps DSVS senior clients to complete SNAP benefit applications when needed. DSVS also piloted a Veterans Ride Share program.

The Council on Aging of Martin County (COAMC) utilizes various strategies to combat food insecurity among our senior population. Arrangements are in place for the Treasure Coast Food Bank to visit COAMC monthly with their Family Market Truck. This provides fresh fruit, vegetables, juice and dairy products.

COAMC partners with The House of Hope to provide 40-50 food boxes monthly with shelf-stable food items. The boxes are distributed to seniors with low-income struggling with increased rent/housing costs.

COAMC has two Navigators. One is in-house and the other is a Mobile Navigator. The in-house Navigator assists seniors via telephone, in-person visits, and home visits, who are seeking resources and assistance with various needs. The Mobile Navigator travels to various senior communities for the purpose of outreach and to provide resources for urgent needs, including food assistance.

COAMC provides transportation to seniors with no transport and who express a need to attend their congregate meal sites, both in Hobe Sound and Indiantown, identified as rural areas.

Older individuals residing in rural areas;	Response: Healthy Aging and Elder Rights will continue working on the relationship with the rural area of Indiantown to promote health education and prevent elder abuse and exploitation as well as share information regarding Agency Services. The two departments will work together to develop one or two new sites where education and outreach can be done in this rural community by the end of the Area Plan cycle. In 2026 Healthy Aging will continue the strides it made with the Indiantown rural community and plans to offer an evidence-based workshop in 2026 and 2027. Consumer Care and Planning will work to include addressing preventing exploitation of vulnerable populations in the rural county of Okeechobee's Department of Health Community Health Improvement Plan. The strategies will include increasing awareness of assistance available through Elder Rights and other resources available through the Area Agency on Aging. Consumer Care and Planning will keep information on the Agency up to date in the Okeechobee Department of Health "MySidewalk" link so that all populations in the rural county are aware of the services available. The Helpline is working with the Glades Initiative and Healthier Glades to collaborate on events and Agency outreach focusing on potential clients residing in Belle Glade, Pahokee, South Bay communities. DSVS has a Senior Center located in the Glades Area; a case manager and assistant manager outreach to the population in this rural area of Palm Beach County on an ongoing and year-round basis by participating in health fairs and educational events and making visits to low income housing residents. In the Glades area DSVS staff will actively participate in outreach efforts including health and wellness, educational,

	recreational, family, and sporting events that bring seniors and families together. In addition, DSVS is leveraging outreach opportunities and efforts with the participation of Community Action staff. This allows DSVS to provide education and access to additional resources, including rental assistance, HVAC replacement assistance, LIHEAP (utility assistance), and other supports. Pahokee and Belle Glade are identified as Rural Areas of Opportunity (RAO), per the office of the Governor, therefore a staff member from MorseLife will be designated to provide outreach and services to this area. The MorseLife team is working in conjunction with PACE through MorseLife Health Systems to provide the outreach and services needed in this area. Staff will go to the Housing Partnership Inc., of Pahokee, Belle Glade Housing Authority, West County Senior Center in Belle Glade and the Pahokee Center. MorseLife provides a Behavioral Health Counselor who meets monthly at the Palm Beach County West County Senior Center to offer individualized counseling and education on available community resources. Targeted populations are grandparents raising grandchildren and caregivers caring for individuals with dementia. MorseLife also collaborates with PACE and participates in health fairs and educational events held within these communities. MorseLife attended the 3rd Annual Multi-Agency education series on December 4, 2025 at West County Senior Center and will attend the scheduled one in 2026. LAS' ELP services cover the rural areas of Palm Beach County through outreach at the West County Senior Center, as well as the rural areas of the Treasure Coast. OSS is in a rural area. To reach clients in rural areas, OSS utilizes local radio/newspaper for special events, senior services webpages on the county website which describes services available and how to access them, and Facebook to promote the congregate meal site and daily activities. There are monthly distribution lists for the Calendar of Events and menus for the congregate meal sites. Brochures are provided throughout the county. HOAs are contacted to allow OSS to make a presentation at a meeting. OSS also posts flyers at RV parks and laundry facilities as allowed. This provider encourages use of Sunshine Calls and transportation to the senior center for nutrition support and socialization. Materials are provided in English and Spanish as needed. In Okeechobee County, the Helpline is working with OSS to focus on outreach in Okeechobee and Taylor Creek communities. Helpline outreach in Martin County is focused in Indiantown with coordinating drop off of brochures and outreach to faith-based organizations.
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	COASL 2025 Participation in the Friendship Church Community Health Fair in a high needs area for targeted outreach COASL continuously participates in health fairs and events in low-income housing communities, faith-based organizations, senior HOA communities and other events in high needs areas for the provision of targeted outreach. Telephone reassurance and literature materials are provided which are available in English, Spanish and Creole. Senior Resource Association (SRA) will participate in health fairs across Indian River County (IRC). On SRA website there is a Navigation system and also links to resources for any IRC residents. SRA provides literature, flyers, pamphlets, and marketing materials to IRC residents. COAMC's Mobile Navigator unit travels throughout Martin County at various senior communities, local libraries, health centers and meal sites to reach isolated, homebound seniors and provide resources and referrals for services.
Older individuals with greatest economic need (with particular attention to low-income older individuals, including low-income minority older individuals, older individuals with limited English proficiency, and older individuals residing in rural areas)	Response: Healthy Aging will continue to provide education and present to the population that United Against Poverty serves in the Treasure Coast. Healthy Aging will expand on the number of presentations in order to promote workshop attendance to have longer interactions with each person in hopes of encouraging a healthy outcome. Healthy Aging will introduce two additional Agency departments (Elder Abuse and SHINE) to the United Against Poverty initiative to expand on the information about resources that the Agency offers to this community. Healthy Aging conducted a health fair in 2025 with United Against Poverty and plans on continuing this partnership in 2026. In South Palm Beach County, The Volen Center will provide training on DOEA services to church groups, low income 55 and older communities & senior centers that are in and near low-income pockets of the South Palm Beach County area. DSVS operates a Senior Center located in the Lake Worth Beach Area. Staff will actively participate in outreach efforts including health and wellness, educational, recreational, family, and sporting events that bring seniors and families together. In addition, DSVS is leveraging outreach opportunities and efforts with the participation of Community Action staff. This allows DSVS to provide education and access to additional resources, including rental assistance, HVAC replacement assistance, LIHEAP (utility assistance), and other supports. This area has a high concentration of low-income individuals and families that are non-English speaking. All activities and written communication are available in both English and Spanish. Spanish-speaking staff is available on site to provide services and engagement to seniors.

	In working with Martin County Department of Health, Healthy Aging is working to deliver programs in Spanish to St. Joseph's Church which has a large low-income Hispanic population. This contact has been shared with other Agency departments to help with their outreach. Healthy Aging has delivered evidence-based programs at House of Hope in Martin County which serves low-income seniors. Healthy Aging will build upon this partnership in 2026. With its strong partnership with Southeast Florida Parish Nurses, Healthy Aging is increasing outreach to seniors with the greatest socio- and economic need to inform them of our services and to grow the volunteers delivering evidence-based workshops. The Agency brochures are given out every Sunday when the nurses deliver services. Their service area runs from Indian River County to Palm Beach County. COAMC continues to secure funds from Community Foundation to assist seniors in Martin County with emergency needs, for example, rental assistance, homeowner association fees, roof repairs, and other emergency needs not covered by the state and federal grants. FPL also donates annually to cover the costs of emergency needs for seniors. Initially, the amount was \$500.00 a year. In 2026, FPL increased this amount to \$3,000.00. In Indian River County, SRA will utilize multiple outlets, such as the Guide to Senior Services and other widely circulated publications, as well as videos posted easy access via the internet, to highlight their menu of services. Additionally, they will produce select printed materials in Spanish. SRA has Radio advice monthly on two radio stations on IRC. The organization provides information through Navigation, Information Referral, and other printed literature about services and community partners. Caregivers tend to self-isolate in their inability to leave their care recipient. MorseLife will partner to offer education and social events that often provide respite. Counselors will then educate caregivers about the availability of in-home counseling services. The minority and/or low-income elder populations that LAS will target in its outreach endeavors include the African-American communities in West Palm Beach, Pleasant City/Mangonia Park, Riviera Beach, Lake Park, Delray Beach, Boynton Beach, Belle Glade, Pahokee and South Bay; the Hispanic communities in Lake Worth, Boynton Beach, Delray Beach, Belle Glade, Pahokee and West Jupiter and the Haitian communities in Boynton Beach, Delray Beach East and the Western communities. These populations have been targeted due to their lack of knowledge of the complexity of the legal system and/or their limited English-speaking ability, they are easy prey for unethical business persons, caretakers and relatives, and there is a high rate of mortgage foreclosures in these areas. ELP
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	targets outreach to seniors in Riviera Beach, Lake Park, Lake Worth, West Palm Beach and the Glades communities to serve individuals with the greatest social need. Staff also provide outreach to seniors to receive services through the Mae Volen Center, North-County Senior Center, Mid-County Senior Center, West County Senior Center, and the Delray Beach Neighborhood Resource Center. ELP staff are also contacted by local government officials who have older constituents that need legal assistance. LAS' ELP outreach efforts to the above minority and low-income communities will consist of contacting the human services organizations that serve these populations, e.g. Florida Rural Legal Services, the Farmworker Coordinating Council, the Guatemalan-Maya Center, the Palm Beach County Refugee Taskforce and the Latin American Immigrant and Refugee Organization, the West County Senior Center and the Glades Interagency Network and advise them of our availability to provide training and speakers on issues of interest to their elderly clients. In addition, staff will contact the local faith-based organizations that serve these communities, e.g. First Baptist Church, St. John Missionary Baptist Church, Mary Mother of Light Catholic Church, Our Lady of Peace Church, St. Ann Church, St. Juliana's Office of Social Ministry Program, St. Thomas Moore Catholic Church, Tabernacle Missionary Baptist Church, etc., to inform them of the type of assistance the ELP can provide to their congregants and parishioners and our availability for speaking engagements and seminars. OSS utilizes local radio/newspaper for special events, senior services webpages on the county website which describes services available and how to access them, and Facebook to promote the congregate meal site and daily activities. There are monthly distribution lists for the Calendar of Events and menus for the congregate meal sites. Brochures are provided throughout the county. HOAs are contacted to allow OSS to make a presentation at a meeting. OSS also posts flyers at RV parks and laundry facilities as allowed. The range of services provided to seniors included but was not limited to wills, powers of attorneys, advanced directives, qualified income trusts, name changes, foreclosure defense, reverse mortgage counseling and foreclosure prevention, guardianships, guardian advocacies, uncontested probate matters, evictions and unlawful detainer cases. We also represented seniors who were victims of elder exploitation by commercial perpetrators, family members or fiduciaries. OSS 2024 Increased the number of weekend food bags to 26 seniors to lessen their food insecurities when OSS is closed through a joint effort with a volunteer group, Okeechobee Packers. The bags were provided each Thursday or the day prior to a holiday. OSS 2024 Intervened in 181 energy crises involving seniors to prevent disconnection, provide restoration of electrical service, and the purchase of window air conditioner units through our EHEAP program. 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	In Palm Beach County TVC utilizes a variety of outreach and education methods to reach older adults, caregivers, low-income individuals, and underserved populations throughout South Palm Beach County. Older individuals with Alzheimer's disease and related disorders with	Response: Helpline and Communication staff foster partnerships with Alzheimer's Community Care and Alzheimer's Association and participation in the Dementia Care and Cure

neurological and organic brain dysfunction	Initiative help in efforts with this population. During Helpline presentations, great effort is made to address families and caregivers dealing with these related conditions, offering options for education, support groups and additional care referred through the ADI program. Many Helpline staff are certified “ALZSTARS”, providing education during calls. OSS refers caregivers to the Alzheimer’s Association. In 2025, partnership with Senior Helpers of the Treasure Coast to provide a caregiver training using Teepa Snow’s GEMS dementia state classification model. Scheduling another training in 2027. COASL 2025 sponsored a Coffee & Conversation Workshop with Treasure Coast Senior Community Resource Connectors on the topic of Alzheimer’s & Dementia Awareness with a guest speaker from the Alzheimer’s Association COASL will partner in 2026 and 2027 with Alzheimer’s Association for the provision of education, awareness and caregiver support. Adult day service as well as facility and in-home respite will be provided for those individuals who are eligible. DSVS staff participate in the Dementia Care and Cure Initiative and attend conferences and trainings related to Dementia to stay relevant to the advances and treatment of the disease. COAMC recently renovated their Adult Day Center to increase the space available for participants in the Integrative Memory Enhancement (IMEP) program. IMEP is a structured, research-based program, that integrates the mind, body, and brain connections to boost cognitive reserve and minimize the progression of memory loss or dementia. IMEP employs specific cognitive and physical exercises designed for seniors and utilizes healing modalities that support overall brain and body function. COAMC also has an in-house licensed, clinical social worker who handles all inquiries for assistance and guidance on Alzheimer’s and memory impairment. The clinical social worker also takes the lead in the HUGS program. Martin County HUGS provides opportunities, education and awareness to individuals who live and work in Martin County so that everyone may be able to respond to families living with dementia in a way that is kind and understanding. TVC provides specialized services and support for older individuals with Alzheimer’s disease and related dementias, as well as their caregivers. Outreach efforts include education, caregiver support, adult day care services, counseling, and partnerships with community organizations serving individuals affected by cognitive impairment. TVC plans to continue to host caregiver education and support events, including dementia-focused programs, to connect
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	caregivers with resources and services that support aging in place. Staff participate in community health fairs, wellness events, and educational programs throughout South Palm Beach County to provide information and referrals to older adults and caregivers. In 2026, AAA/SHINE joined Cognitive Wellness Alliance in St. Lucie County to publicize SHINE/MIPPA counseling and referrals to Area Agency on Aging and SHINE. Will continue into 2027.
Older individuals at risk for institutional placement	Response: Caregivers who receive supportive counseling services are very often able to continue caregiving and maintain their loved ones at home. MorseLife counselors encourage physicians, hospitals, rehabs, home health agencies and lead agencies in Palm Beach and the Treasure Coast to refer for counseling whenever a caregiver is showing signs of burnout. LAS staff will participate in events such as monthly legal clinics at the Veterans Administration Medical Center, local senior centers, the Fearless Caregiver conferences, health fairs and community resource events to reach older individuals that are at risk for institutional placement. COASL will host an annual Caregiver Event, including relevant community partners for the provision of education, service options, resources and supports for caregivers. In March 2024, MorseLife teamed up with the Kane Center for the ninth annual caregiver workshop with several other sponsors to present an educational and fun caregiver symposium. In December 2024, MorseLife presented with Area Agency on Aging at the Fenn Center in Fort Pierce and discussed accessing community resources and providing educational information for caregivers, including offering caregiver counseling to the community. MorseLife continues to participate in the Dementia Care & Cure Initiative in collaboration with Area Agency on Aging. For the tenth consecutive year, MorseLife caregiver counselors helped plan and present the Annual Caregiver Workshop in partnership with The Kane Center, APDA, the Alzheimer's Association, Senior Helpers, and other community sponsors. This year's event themed "Caregiver Awards," celebrated caregivers with the glamour and excitement of the Oscars and attracted a large community turnout. On June 10, 2025: MorseLife caregiver counselors partnered with APDA to present an educational forum at the Verano 55+ Community in Port St. Lucie. On October 21, 2025: Staff promoted caregiver support groups during an APDA sponsored event at Harbor Place in Port St. Lucie. MorseLife staff will attend the 4th Multi Agency Fall Prevention Series scheduled in Royal Palm Beach for 9/18/2026, Delray Community Center for 10/07/2026 and Burns Road for 11/18/2026 to provide outreach to caregivers.
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	MorseLife staff continues to participate in the Dementia Care & Cure Initiative in collaboration with Area Agency on Aging. MorseLife's Caregiver Counselor is spearheading a committee to create a Caregiver event in Port St. Lucie in the Fall, but no definitive date as of yet. The Caregiver event at the Kane Center is on March 12, 2027. COAMC hosts three free monthly caregiver support groups where caregivers can share tips, resources, and experiences with other caregivers, under the direction of a licensed clinical social worker with in-depth experience in elder care issues. During Helpline outreach, information is presented for caregivers to find educational opportunities to learn more about these disorders. Supportive services are explained in detail so caregivers learn to better take care of themselves by utilizing respite services ,support groups and specialized training. 	ACC operates 11 Specialized Alzheimer's Care and Service Centers with locations throughout Palm Beach, Martin, and St. Lucie Counties. The Specialized Adult Day Care service provided therapeutic activities, meals, and health monitoring for 334 unduplicated patients in our day centers with 334 caregivers receiving respite. The Family Navigator serves as a lifeline for families in Palm Beach, Martin and St. Lucie counties who are living with Alzheimer's disease and related neurocognitive disorders. The FN's provide caregivers with the support, tools and resources needed to continue providing home-based care for their loved ones. The ACC ID Locator Service provides an additional safety net tool for patients with Alzheimer's disease and related neurocognitive disorders who may wander away from a safe and supervised setting. ACC led a contingency of 13 volunteers in February of 2025 (mostly caregivers from the three counties) and 9 staff/board members to Tallahassee to educate legislators and staff on the needs of Florida's families impacted by Alzheimer's disease COASL will host an annual Caregiver Event with relevant community partners, including Alzheimer's Association, for the provision of education, service options, resources and supports for Caregivers. Palm Beach County DSVS partners with Palm Beach Sheriffs' Office (PBSO) and their Project LifeSaver program which provides a radio frequency tracking device for patients with Alzheimer's disease and related neurocognitive disorders who may wander away from a safe and supervised setting. This supports caregivers providing ongoing supervision. COAMC's Adult Day Club is an excellent option for respite care. Clients benefit from socialization, therapy and enhanced care, while their loved ones get a much-needed break. The Club's support services are designed to give caregivers vital respite time, with the peace of mind of knowing that their loved ones are in the very best of hands. Caregivers of seniors coping with dementia can receive guidance and support through COAMC's GUIDE: Guiding an Improved Dementia Experience program. The program includes respite care for unpaid caregivers. Caregivers in need of professional guidance navigating the myriad of challenges of aging or caring for an aging loved one can meet one-on-one with COAMC's Licensed Clinical Social Worker.

Education will define the basics of respite care and adult day services, and how they can assist with caregiver burnout or isolation. LAS' ELP staff participate in events such as the Fearless Caregiver conferences, health fairs and community resource events to reach caregivers who have the greatest social need. OSS utilizes local radio/newspaper for special events, senior services webpages on the county website which describes services available and how to access them, and Facebook to promote the congregate meal site and daily activities. There are monthly distribution lists for the Calendar of Events and menus for the congregate meal sites. Brochures are provided throughout the county. HOAs are contacted to allow OSS to make a presentation at a meeting. OSS also posts flyers at RV parks and laundry facilities as allowed. This provider encourages use of Sunshine Calls and transportation to the senior center for nutrition support and socialization. Materials are provided in English and Spanish as needed. Caregivers are referred to Alzheimer's Associations. Caregivers tend to self-isolate in their inability to leave their care recipient. MorseLife will partner to offer education and social

	events that often provide respite. Counselors will then educate caregivers about the availability of in-home counseling services. COASL offers congregate dining with social activities at multiple locations across the county with plans to expand availability of sites to address the social needs of caregivers. COASL currently has 2 senior centers in the community, located in Fort Pierce and Port St. Lucie, for the convenience of our senior population, both offering activities daily. DSVS refers caregivers at risk of burnout in social isolation to education opportunities such as “Powerful Tools for Caregivers” and other support groups. Caregivers of adult daycare clients can participate in activities, classes, social events, and meals at the senior center.
Caregivers who are older individuals with greatest economic need (with particular attention to low-income older individuals)	Response: Healthy Aging will partner with meal sites in promoting Caregiver workshops in Palm Beach and St. Lucie counties over the next 3 years. Caregivers are referred to Alzheimer’s Associations. COASL will host an annual Caregiver Event including relevant community partners for the provision of education, service options, resources and supports for Caregivers. TVC maintains a strong presence in the community through partnerships with local organizations and by attending health fairs, wellness events, and educational programs.

	DSVS staff refers caregivers and clients to the Area Agency on Aging, for programs and services such as SHINE, HCE, Basic Subsidy and services, and DCF for financial assistance and Medicaid. Caregivers and clients are encouraged to attend congregate meal sites for food and socialization. DSVS currently operates 13 meal sites in Palm Beach County. Low-income caregivers and clients facing financial hardships are referred to the Community Action Program for assistance. Senior Centers hosts community organizations such as LAS for legal and other services. COAMC hosts virtual support groups via ZOOM. Sessions are held the first and third Wednesdays of each month: 10:30 a.m. – Noon. The sessions are open to all caregivers, including adult children caring for an aging relative. ALL family caregivers are welcome to join on Zoom! Martin County or Florida residency is not required. Caregivers can join us virtually from anywhere in the world!
Caregivers who are older individuals who provide care to individuals with severe disabilities, including children with severe disabilities	Response: All of MorseLife's outreach efforts will focus on older individuals, including that caregiving for a child with disabilities. Staff will make local agencies such as Children's Services Council and Tykes and Teens aware of the availability of no-cost counseling for such individuals. LAS' ELP staff will participate in events such as the Fearless Caregiver conferences, schools and organizations that provide services to individuals with autism, kinship support groups, health fairs and community resource events to reach caregivers who are providing care to individuals with severe disabilities. While promoting Caregiver support in the community, Helpline staff can offer additional resources for older adults caring for children with disabilities, referring to other partner agencies such as CILO and the Children's Network. OSS utilizes local radio/newspaper for special events, senior services webpages on the county website which describes services available and how to access them, and Facebook to promote the congregate meal site and daily activities. There are monthly distribution lists for the Calendar of Events and menus for the congregate meal sites. Brochures are provided throughout the county. HOAs are contacted to allow OSS to make a presentation at a meeting. OSS also posts flyers at RV parks and laundry facilities as allowed. This provider encourages use of Sunshine Calls and transportation to the senior center for nutrition support and socialization. Materials are provided in English and Spanish as needed. Caregivers are referred to Alzheimer's Associations. COASL partners with ARC of the Treasure Coast to ensure individuals with disabilities and their caregivers will be provided with education, resources and support. COASL will host an annual Caregiver Event including relevant community partners for the provision of education, service options, resources and supports for Caregivers.

Unmet Needs and Service Opportunities

This section defines the significant unmet needs for services and how the AAA will address gaps in service.

Access to Services:

Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation

Lead Agency Providers served 30 high risk APS referrals in 2022. The Helpline managed 136 medium and low risk APS referrals. The Elder Rights Department trained 263 professionals on Elder Abuse, Neglect, and Exploitation in 2022 and participated in 26 educational outreach events providing presentations and brochures/materials to over 900 people. Strategies in this Area Plan include education and outreach by Elder Rights to continually seek venues to promote awareness of Abuse, Neglect and Exploitation within the older adult communities within our Planning and Service Area.

Counties or communities with limited access to transportation

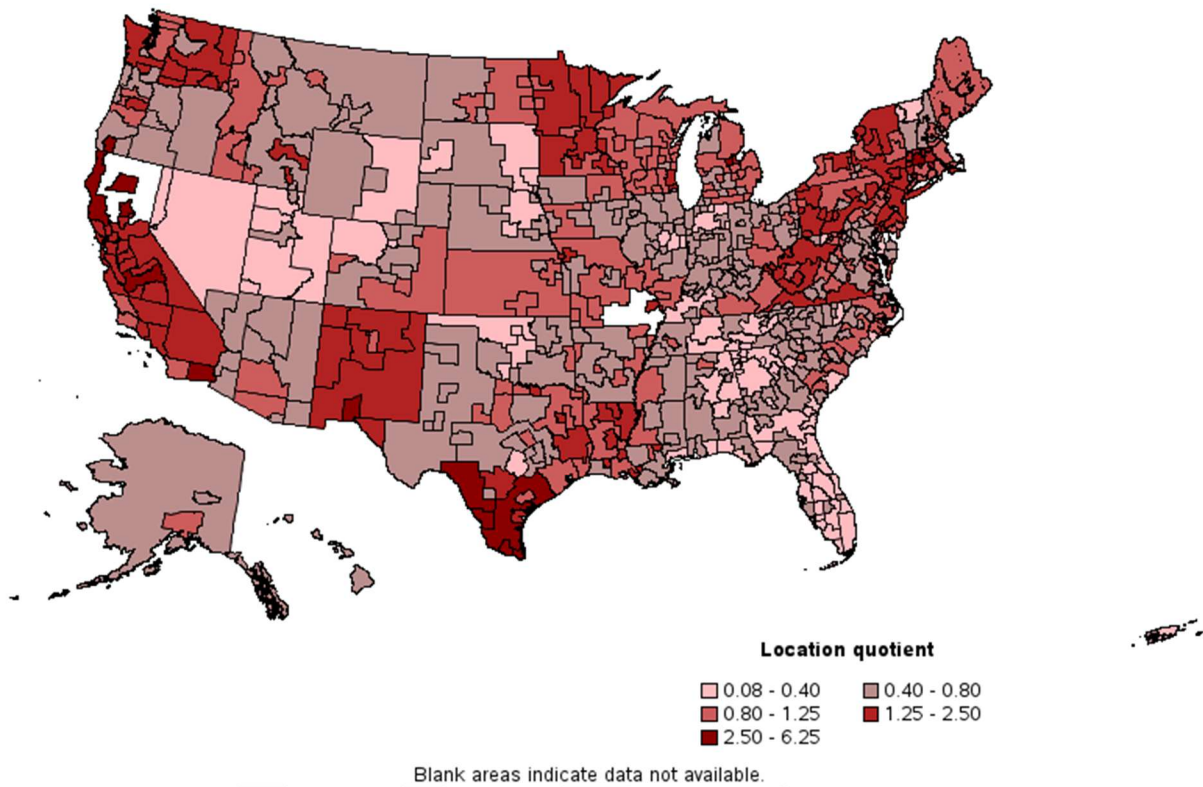
The number of transportation trips in Okeechobee is significantly low. Consumer Care and Planning staff participate on the Okeechobee County Department of Health Community Health Improvement Plan Implementation Committee which is developing objectives to increase ridership in Okeechobee County. The Agency's Consumer Care and Planning department participates on local transportation boards in all counties of the Planning and Service Area to advocate for the needs of seniors and suggest solutions. Contracted providers offer transportation services under OAA funding.

Counties or communities with limited access to significant supportive services

In Okeechobee County there is no Adult Day Care Center. Okeechobee only has one Assisted Living Facility.

The location quotient below from the Bureau of Labor Statistics for Home Health Aids and Personal Care Aids shows the lowest concentrations of these services for all of our counties. This significantly impacts seniors' ability to obtain the care they need and opportunities for respite for caregivers.

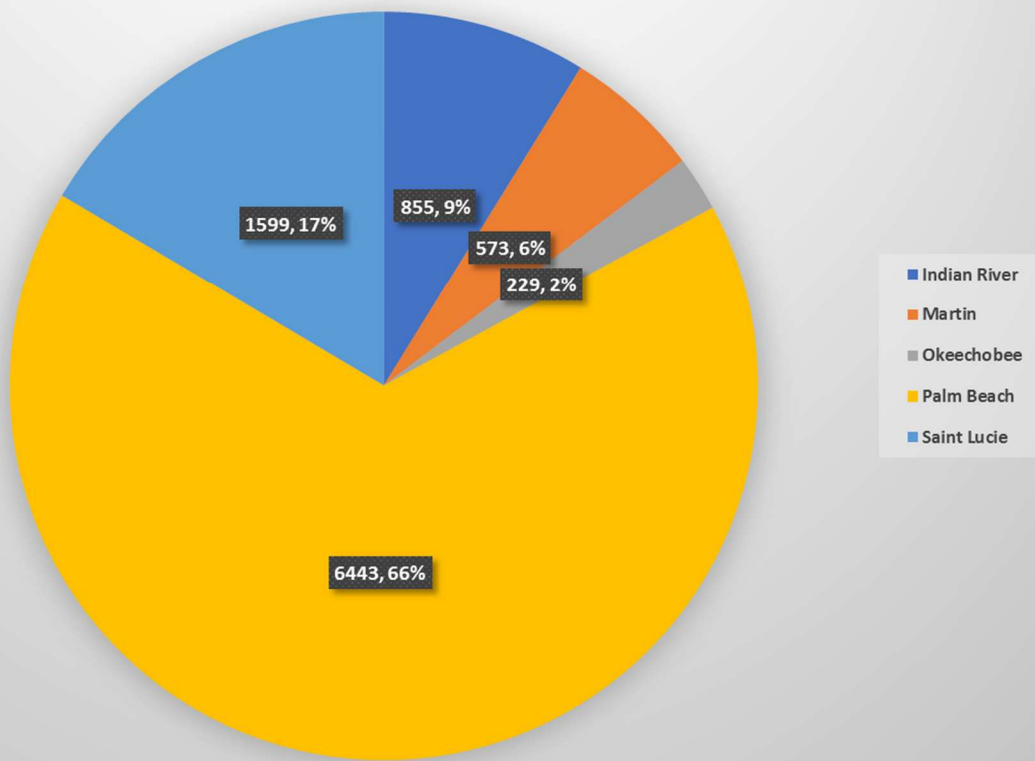
Location quotient of home health and personal care aides, by area, May 2022

Counties or communities with limited availability of and/or access to legal assistance

Legal Aid Society of Palm Beach County provides legal assistance throughout the PSA and has staff available to travel to clients' homes. They operate programs beyond those that our agency funds.

Counties or communities with limited access to social services agencies

Both 211 and our Helpline provide information and referral services throughout our Planning and Service Area. The Palm Beach County Partnership for Aging is a not-for-profit local organization which focuses its energies on enhancing the life of older persons, their families and their communities through advocacy, information sharing and

education. The Inter-Agency Network of Palm Beach County is one of Palm Beach County's oldest "community-wide" networking groups. At monthly meetings, participants learn about important resources and events. The Agency staff and Advisory Council members participate in all of these organizations.

Analysis of service implications of identified unmet access needs

PSA 9's area plan includes strategies to ensure that all departments that do outreach mention the full array of services that are available to seniors, caregivers, and persons with disabilities. Staff has worked diligently to get senior and caregiver needs such as insurance, long term care services and healthy living programs into the local departments of health community improvement plans as well as Age Friendly and Dementia Care and Cure Initiatives.

Caregiver:

Number of elder caregivers, including number of grandparents raising grandchildren

According to the Department of Elder Affairs 2022 County Profiles, there are currently 90,495 persons 60+ with at least one type of disability and 79,693 probable Alzheimer's cases among those 65+ in PSA 9. Among the disabilities there are 41,195 persons 60+ in PSA 9 with a self-care disability and 74,835 with an independent living disability. Though not all have caregivers, there certainly is an opportunity to reach out to those with caregivers to offer support. There are 6,935 grandparents raising grandchildren in PSA 9.

Analysis of service implications of identified caregiver unmet needs

Counseling services are available under the Older Americans Act both for clients and caregivers. Our legal service providers serve all caregiver populations. The Agency provides evidenced-based Powerful Tools for Caregivers workshops and has started Caregiver Follow-up service under the American Rescue Plan funding. Staff participates on the Palm Health Foundation's Healthier Boynton Beach Initiative which serves caregivers in low-income neighborhoods.

Communities:

Limited Access to Senior Centers

All of the Senior Centers in PSA 9 have transportation available to access the senior center. Our contracted providers have added computer training to the activities available at senior centers. Others have included intergenerational programs, and still others have included clinics with medical services and or mental health services available onsite.

Housing and Safety Needs

The chart below from DOEA's 2022 County Profiles shows Households with a High Cost Burden. Households with a high cost burden have occupants age 65+ paying more than 30% of income for housing costs and having an income below 50% of the area median income.

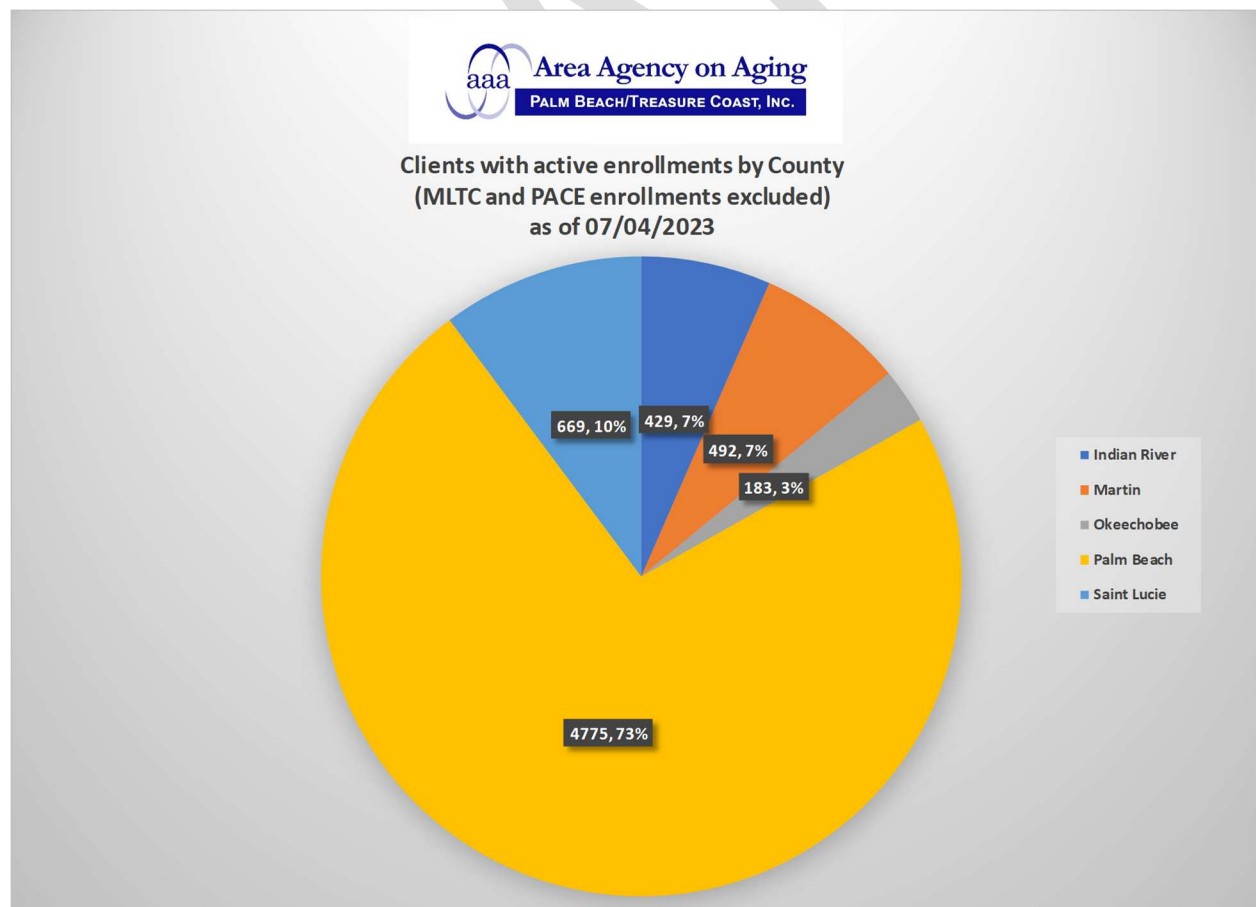
Analysis of service implications of identified unmet health care needs

The data on falls, diabetes self-management education, and arthritis, reflect a continued need for OAA IIID programs for fall prevention and chronic disease self-management. The strategies in the Area Plan reflect efforts to expand these services.

Our OAA providers deliver Mental Health Counseling/Screening and Gerontological Counseling to help address the needs of those with depressive disorders. Education/Training and Powerful Tools for Caregivers is offered to support caregivers' dealing with the stress of caring for loved ones.

Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS):

The number of clients active in Home and Community-Based Services in PSA 9 is 6,548 as of July 2023. A breakdown by county is shown on the chart below.



Performance Measures Listing

In terms of the unmet needs and service opportunities identified above, the progress that has been made toward meeting the Performance Requirements established by DOEA is listed below.

In regard to the DOEA Performance Measure of Number of Caregivers Served (Caregiver Support), more than 722 caregivers received either group or individual counseling services during calendar year 2025 and 66 caregivers received legal services from October 2024 through September 2025.

In regard to the DOEA Performance Measure regarding Number of Elders Served with Early Intervention/Prevention, 359 persons completed Title IID evidence-based workshops in 2025.

In regard to the DOEA Performance Measure Elders with Alzheimer's Disease or Cognitive Impairment Served, more than 611 persons were served in 2025 through our ADI program.

In regard to the DOEA Performance Measure of Number of Congregate Meals Provided, more than 287,857 Congregate Meals were provided in 2025.

In regard to the DOEA Performance Measure of Number of Home-Delivered Meals provided, more than 458,124 Home-Delivered Meals were provide in 2025.

In regard to the DOEA Performance Measures of Number of elders served with OAA Registered Long-Term Care Services and Number of Persons Served with Community-Based Long-Term Care Services, 7,295 persons were served through OAA, ADI, CCE, and HCE programs.

Emergency Preparedness

Coordination:

Key points of contact are the local Emergency Operation Centers. Each local Emergency Operation Center reports into a coordinated Florida Statewide system. Close coordination at the EOC level avoids duplication and fragmentation of the recovery. At the state level, the CEO and the Emergency Coordinating Officer participate in all calls coordinated by the Department of Elder Affairs.

The Emergency Coordinating Officer annually reviews the Agency's CEMP and COOP. Consumer Care and Planning reviews those of the Agency's providers. Before, during

and after an emergency, the communication with Aging Network providers is in place to assess unmet needs, offer technical assistance and gather and maintain current information regarding the status of services, including closings and re-openings. The Emergency Coordinating Officer takes the lead in communications and consolidating needs across the service area.

The Agency's Emergency Coordinating Officer participates in the Palm Beach County Long-Term Recovery Coalition which includes representation from emergency partners such as United Way, Legal Aid Society, Florida Health, Alzheimer's Community Care, the Alzheimer's Association, the Red Cross, Feeding South Florida, The Lord's Place Cross Ministries and others. The Helpline Director serves on the Board of the United Way Emergency Food and Shelter Program which awards applications to local organizations that help in an emergency.

Contact:

In the event of a disaster, the Emergency Coordinating Officer will coordinate with personnel at each of the five county's Emergency Management Departments. Current contacts are: David Johnson, Director of Emergency Services, Indian River County; Ben Johnson, Director of Emergency Management, Martin County; Tod Hardacre, Director of Emergency Management, Okeechobee County; Mary Blakeney, Director of Public Safety Palm Beach County, Ron Guerrero, Director of Public Safety, St. Lucie County.

The Aging Network providers are key in both preparation and recovery. The emergency personnel with our lead agencies (The Volen Center, The Kane Center, Council on Aging of Martin County, Palm Beach County Division of Senior and Veteran Services, Okeechobee Senior Services, Council on Aging of St. Lucie and other contracted providers in our service area) have established primary and secondary emergency contacts. A database of current contact information is maintained by the Agency's Emergency Coordinating Officer which includes phone numbers and email addresses. Email blasts are used as the primary means of communication.

Continuity of Operations and Critical Services:

Helpline associates are all equipped to work remotely with access to all systems. In the event of an emergency situation which would eliminate the remote option, the Agency has an MOU in place with PSA 8. If PSA 8 were affected by the emergency, appropriate coverage would be coordinated through F4A. Post disaster the goal is to resume local Helpline support as quickly as possible.

Information Systems are critical to the Agency's business continuity. All essential infrastructure such as application servers, file servers and the phone system are housed in a secure data center in Broward County. The facility is category 5 hurricane certified.

Only authorized personnel are allowed into the facility. Each visitor must have a valid driver's license and be listed as authorized by the Agency IT administrator. Every associate is equipped to work remotely with access to all systems and telephones.

The Fiscal Department's operation is critical to the Agency's operations and recovery. The Agency has contingency plans in place that will enable the financial functions to be back online at the earliest possible date. The Agency's operational objective is to have in place a viable COOP which allows the fiscal operations to perform and maintain specified essential functions during or shortly after any emergency or disruption event.

The core fiscal functions are to:

- Procure goods and services needed for emergency and day-to-day operations
- Manage and administer payroll
- Manage and administer Accounts Payable
- Work with Program Directors to identify disaster related costs eligible for insurance recovery
- Maintain payments to providers

In the event that the EOC is activated, the fiscal section will perform the following functions:

- Time Keeping
- Payroll
- Accounts Payable
- Cost Accounting
- Claims
- Purchasing
- Recovery

The Fiscal Department will be responsible for maintaining records on damage expenditure, recovery cost expenditures, insurance related documents, personnel overtime, and other costs associated with the emergency.

The Fiscal Department will compile reports, including total expenditures by category. The Agency utilizes a cloud based timekeeping system. Payroll will continue to function through the existing software during emergency operations periods.

Aging Network Providers are critical to support existing clients and older adults that have been impacted by a disaster. The Agency's goal is to support all providers in recovery efforts. After an emergency the Emergency Coordinating Officer will facilitate and maintain communication with providers to assess unmet needs, offer technical assistance and support their efforts to resume all services and operations. As needs are identified, the Agency will coordinate with Emergency Operations and/or DOEA, as appropriate.

Assessment and Resource Allocation:

After a disaster, a priority is placed on resuming the operation of the Helpline to provide assistance to our clients and the senior population in the community. Each contracted provider performs a call down of active clients to assess needs. The Helpline also completes telephone reassurance to check on **waitlist pre-enrollment list** clients regarding their wellbeing and/or unmet needs and offer assistance accordingly.

The Agency collaborates with DOEA and Emergency Management as Disaster Recovery Centers are activated.

	ADC rooms to expand the space for IMEQ due to increased attendance. Attendance fluctuates, and there are currently 15-28 participants on a daily basis. Some of the Agency's contracted providers

This includes, Zumba Gold, Chair Yoga, Senior Fitness, Toning/Stretching Classes, Line Dancing, Free Movies, Knitting Club, Bridge, Pinochle, and Mah Jong. In Indian

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River County our contracted provider has scheduled activities and guest speakers at social dining sites and ADC locations. These include a DJ for music and dancing, the Art Institute to do art, and dog therapy to name just a few. The Agency's contracted provider in Okeechobee County offers daily activities that are designed to engage and challenge the seniors to remain active during this stage of life. They incorporate light exercises, standing and sitting, each day. The Agency's contracted provider in St. Lucie County offers chair exercises, and tabletop activities are developed and provided for those with limited mobility in ADA compliant locations. The Agency's contracted providers take extra steps to involve buses with lifts and help those who have a caregiver providing transportation.

	Some providers offer a hybrid model of in-person and virtual groups and classes to provide a higher degree of involvement for those who face challenges with transportation, accessibility, or a need for respite care. The Agency's contracted providers consistently use social and digital platforms to raise awareness about senior issues including food security, safety and independence. In the Agency's contracted provider's Specialized Day Centers there is programming designed to encourage patients to maintain their highest level of physical and cognitive functioning. Therapeutic activities cover a wide range from chair yoga, art therapy and trivia to name a few.

This includes visiting senior communities to conduct presentations on abuse and what to do

Information concerning whether there is a significant population of older Native Americans in the planning and service area and if so, an assurance that the AAA will pursue activities, including outreach, to increase access of those older Native Americans to programs and benefits provided under this title;
- b. An assurance that the AAA will, to the maximum extent practicable, coordinate the services provided under Title VI; and
- c. An assurance that the AAA will make services under the area plan available to the same extent; as such services are available to older individuals within the planning and service area, who are older Native Americans. (§306(a)(11))

10. The AAA assures it will maintain the integrity and public purpose of services provided, and service providers, under 42 USCS §§ 3021 *et seq.* in all contractual and commercial relationships. (§306(a)(13)(A))

11. The AAA assures it will disclose to the Assistant Secretary and the State Agency:

- a. The identity of each non-governmental entity with which such agency has a contract or commercial relationships relating to providing any service to older individuals; and
- b. The nature of such contract or such relationship. (§306(a)(13)(B))

12. The AAA assures it will demonstrate that a loss or diminution on the quantity or quality of the services provided, or to be provided, under 42 USCS §§ 3021 *et seq.* by such agency has not resulted and will not result from such non-governmental contracts or such commercial relationships. (§306(a)(13)(C))

13. The AAA assures it will demonstrate that the quantity and quality of the services to be provided under this title by such agency will be enhanced as a result of such non-governmental contracts or commercial relationships. (§306(a)(13)(D))

14. The AAA assures it will, on the request of the Assistant Secretary of State, for the purpose of monitoring compliance with this Act (including conducting an audit), disclose all sources and expenditures of funds such agency receives or expends to provide services to older individuals (§306(a)(13)(E))

15. The AAA assures that funds received under this title will not be used to pay any part of a cost (including an administrative cost) incurred by the AAA to carry out a contract or commercial relationship that is not carried out to implement this title. (§306(a)(14))

16. The AAA assures that preference in receiving services under this title will not be given by the AAA to particular older individuals as a result of a contract or commercial relationship that is not carried out to implement this title. (§306(a)(14))

17. The AAA assures that funds received under this title will be used:

- a. To provide benefits and services to older individuals, giving priority to older individuals identified in paragraph (4)(A)(i); and
- b. In compliance with the assurances specified in paragraph (13) and the limitations specified in section 212. (§306(a)(15))

18. The AAA assures that data will be collected to determine that services are needed by older individuals whose needs were the focus of all centers funded under title IV in fiscal year 2019 and to determine the effectiveness of the programs, policies, and services provided by AAAs in assisting such individuals. (§306(a)(18))

19. The AAA assures that outreach efforts will be used to identify individuals eligible for assistance under this Act, with special emphasis on those individuals whose needs were the focus of all centers funded under title IV in fiscal year 2019. (§306(a)(19))
